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Dear Friends.

November is a month of remembering—sometimes even called the month of the dead. We have remembered all the saints, and particularly those we have known at All Saints and All Souls; we have remembered those who fell in war; and some of us will have remembered Guy Fawkes, that 17th century terrorist, with a local bonfire. Remembering is good—or at least it should be. Sadly, the wrong sort of remembering is responsible for much of the strife we see in the world today. I remember as a child studying the so called "War of 1812" between Canada and the United States on both sides of the border. It was amazing. Different people, different battles, even a different outcome—you'd hardly have thought it was the same war! Yes, "we" were always right, and "we" won in the end. Fortunately, those memories have faded, and there is peace along one of the longest boundaries in the world. Partly this is because people have forgotten some things. More importantly it is because people have met one another and learned more about one another. Other parts of the world are not so fortunate.

Everyone suffers in times of conflict, and there has been a lot of suffering at Holy Trinity this year. No, don't forget about it; try to see how others remember. Whoever "we" are, we are not always right. God never calls us to pity ourselves, and rarely calls us to attribute blame. We are called to pity others, and in understanding them to help them understand us. This is all the more important during a vacancy, when the search to find a new Rector is in part a search to learn more about one another and the vocation of this congregation.

The new Church Year will have begun by the time you read this. Happy New Year! The word Advent simply means "arrival" and had they had trains in ancient Rome, the arrivals board would have been headed "ADVENTUS". The remarkable story of the census in Luke's gospel, makes Bethlehem a very busy place, but once again, we are all called to go there in heart and mind. The Vestry and the Team hope that we can do something to help some of our younger friends travel with us — more about that later.

Dear All,

Thank you to those who came along to our congregational meetings. (More than a third of our adult Roll.) Each group expressed its appreciation of the opportunity to be involved in the consultation process and the Vestry, in its turn, was delighted with the response. Thanks, too, to those who contributed by letter, telephone or any other means. Your comments and responses have been collated and discussed at a follow-up Vestry meeting and will now contribute to the final form of the Profile and Specification to be submitted to the Bishop.

The next step will be in his hands. At a recent meeting, he suggested that there are Clergy he knows of who might be interested in, and suitable for, Holy Trinity. If this proves to be the case it will not be necessary to advertise – which would be the preferred option. As Christmas is fast approaching, it is likely to be into the New Year before there are any further developments.

With something of a lull in the production of paperwork and all the talk of profiles, job descriptions and specifications, and before we move into preparation for interviews - we hope! - now would seem to be the right time to focus more on the spiritual dimension which, for some, has not been as much in evidence as it might have been. For that purpose, it is proposed to set up a prayer group or groups. The overall impression created by the consultation process, which still continues, is that whilst there is anger and disappointment out there, there is also hope and expectancy. By looking at recent events in the light of what we can learn from them we hope to be able to move forward together for the benefit of our Rector, to be appointed, and the future of Holy Trinity.

OPENING UP OUR WORSHIP

From January until Easter the team, in response to a request received through the Vestry, will plan worship at 10am on certain selected Sundays to try to be more accessible to families as well as all other members of the congregation. The ministry of the Word—the first half of the service—will be affected by this. The second half—the ministry of the Sacrament following the Offertory, will be as normal in the Blue Book—the 1982 Liturgy.

The first Sunday we shall try this is 4th January when we celebrate Epiphany, the visit of the Wise Men, the Manifestation of Christ. We ask for your support in this move which will be evaluated after Easter. We hope that you will encourage people to worship with us. We welcome your comments, ideas and any constructive feedback you may wish to offer.

The Post Office is to issue both secular stamps and Religious stamps but like last year, you have to stipulate if you want religious! Aparently each PO has been asked to send in to HQ totals for each (possibly to say there is no demand for the latter!) Please make everyone you know aware of this and the Christians amongst us should ask for religious stamps in order to keep Jesus at the centre of the event.

MARK'S GOSPEL

For many hundreds of years Mark's gospel attracted less attention in lectionaries (the readings set day by day and week by week) in church and from scholars and commentators than the other gospels. During the last century this has changed and there has been much study and reflection on this gospel. Our present practice of sticking mainly to one gospel each year for Sunday readings gives us the chance to follow through the proclamation of the Gospel by each evangelist. Gloria hopes to draw on the insights of different scholars through a series on Mark's Gospel between now and Easter. If you have comments or questions please send them to the editor.

John Wood starts us off:

The Church's New Year begins on the first Sunday of Advent, November 30. This brings about a change in our lectionary readings in church for the coming year. We move from Matthew's gospel to that of Mark.

It is generally agreed by New Testament scholars that Mark's gospel was the first to be written soon after the deaths of Peter and Paul, probably in AD 65. It is the shortest of the four gospels. The writer has been identified with John Mark, son of Mary, at whose house the first Christians used to meet in Jerusalem.

Mark has been described as Peter's 'interpreter', writing down the narrative and death of Jesus based on what he had heard from Peter himself. In reading the gospel we might notice from time to time evidence of eye-witness reporting, which reflects the part that Peter's talk and preaching played in the composition of the book.

In reading Mark's gospel we are reading the gospel in its basic and earliest form, written not more than a generation after the events it describes. People were still alive who could challenge its accuracy. This can give us confidence that we are reading a faithful account of what actually happened, allowing for the fact that no human record is infallible.

What are the characteristics to look for in Mark's gospel which we shall be focusing on in the months ahead?

William Barclay has said that it is the nearest thing we will ever get to a report of Jesus's life. Mark tells the facts of Jesus's life in a simple, straightforward, yet dramatic way.

He never forgets the divine side of Jesus. He begins with a declaration of faith: 'The beginning of the gospel of Jesus Christ, the Son of God.' Again and again Mark speaks of the impact Jesus made on the minds and hearts of those who heard him.

At the same time there is no gospel which gives such a human picture of Jesus. To Mark he is simply 'the carpenter'. Mark tells us about the emotions of Jesus. 'He was moved with compassion'. 'Jesus sighed deeply in his spirit.' 'He marvelled at their unbelief'. He was moved with righteous anger'. The sheer humanity of Jesus brought out in Mark's picture of him can bring Jesus very near to us.

Another of the great characteristics of Mark is the way he inserts little vivid details into the narrative – the hallmark of the eye witness. When Jesus rebuked the disciples for keeping the children from him, only Mark among the gospel writers finishes: 'And he put his arms around them, laid his hands on them and blessed them'. All the tenderness of Jesus is in this little vivid addition. And there are others to note in Mark's gospel which seem to point to Peter seeing these incidents again with the eye of memory.



JARS OF GRACE FOR UNICEF

I have been asked again this year if Holy Trinity will participate In the Jars of Grace scheme to raise funds for UNICEF (United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund). Vestry has given its approval to Holy Trinity's participation.

For those who may not know what this is all about, please let me explain!

UNICEF provides labels for you to wrap around on an empty jar which sits on your kitchen/dining table (or anywhere else you tend to eat). The idea is that every time you sit down to a meal, you drop some loose change (or notes or cheques!) into the jar as you say grace and when it is full, you hand it over to me for transmission to UNICEF. Then you can start on another jar if you feel so inclined.

The collection period will last from Advent Sunday (November 30th) until Epiphany (January 4th). The labels will be available at the back of the church very soon so, as soon as you spot them, please do take one and make up your jar. Christmas is coming so you'll probably have lots of guests to ask to help fill your jar.

This year's UNICEF appeal is for that tragic area of Africa, Congo. Please help.
